## BIOGRAPHIES OF LECTURERS

**Nicholas Burns** is the Roy and Barbara Goodman Family Professor of the Practice of Diplomacy and International Relations at the Harvard Kennedy School. He is the founder and Faculty Chair of the Future of Diplomacy Project and Faculty Chair of the Project on Europe and the Transatlantic Relationship. Burns is Director of the Aspen Strategy Group, Senior Counselor at the Cohen Group, and serves on the Board of Directors of Entegris, Inc. Burns served in the United States government as a career Foreign Service Officer. He was Under Secretary of State for Political Affairs from 2005 to 2008; the State Department's third-ranking official. He was U.S. Ambassador to NATO (2001-2005), Ambassador to Greece (1997-2001) and State Department Spokesman (1995-1997). He worked on the National Security Council as Senior Director for Russia, Ukraine and Eurasia Affairs; Special Assistant to President Clinton; and Director for Soviet Affairs for President George H.W. Bush. Burns served in the American Consulate General in Jerusalem where he coordinated U.S. economic assistance to the Palestinian people in the West Bank and before that, at the American embassies in Egypt and Mauritania. He was a member of Secretary of State John Kerry's Foreign Affairs Policy Board from 2014-2017. He is a graduate of Boston College (B.A. 1978) and the Johns Hopkins School of Advanced International Studies (M.A. 1980) and earned the Certificat Pratique de Langue Francaise at the University of Paris-Sorbonne (1977).



**Karl Kaiser** is Adjunct Professor of Public Policy Emeritus at the Kennedy School and a Fellow of the Project on Europe and the Transatlantic Relationship at the Belfer Center for Science and International Affairs. He was educated at the Universities of Cologne, Grenoble and Oxford, was assistant to Henry Kissinger at Harvard, and taught at the Universities of Bonn, Johns Hopkins (Bologna), Saarbrücken, Cologne, the Hebrew University, and the Departments of Government and Social Studies of Harvard. He was a Director of the German Council on Foreign Relations, Bonn/Berlin, and an advisor to Chancellors Brandt and Schmidt. He is a recipient of the Atlantic Award of NATO. Professor Kaiser is the author or editor of numerous articles and books in the fields of world affairs, German, French, British and US foreign policy, transatlantic and East-West relations, nuclear proliferation, and international environmental policy. He holds a Ph.D. from Cologne University and an Honorary Doctorate of the Russian Academy of Sciences.



**Tawakkol Karman** was awarded the 2011 Nobel Peace Prize in recognition of her nonviolent struggle for the safety of women and their right to full participation peacebuilding process in Yemen. Karman was the first Yemeni, the first Arab woman, and the second Muslim woman to receive this honor, and at 32, was the youngest Nobel Laureates to date. Karman is a mother of three as well as a human rights activist, journalist, politician, and the president of the organization Women Journalists Without Chains.. She is a General Coordinator of the Revolutionary Youth Council in Yemen and a member of the advisory board for Transparency International as well as several other international human rights NGOs. Bold and outspoken, Karman has been imprisoned on a number of occasions for her pro-democracy, pro-human rights protests. Amongst Yemen's Youth movement, she is known as "mother of the revolution", "the iron woman", and the Lady of the Arab Spring. She received an undergraduate degree in Commerce from the University of Science and Technology in Sana'a and completed a graduate degree in Political Science at the University of Sana'a.



**Jane Mansbridge**, Charles F. Adams Professor of Political Leadership and Democratic Values, is the author of *Beyond Adversary Democracy*, an empirical and normative study of face-to-face democracy, and the award-winning *Why We Lost the ERA*, a study of anti-deliberative dynamics in social movements based on organizing for an Equal Rights Amendment to the U.S. Constitution. She is also editor or coeditor of the volumes *Beyond Self-Interest*, *Feminism*, *Oppositional Consciousness*, *Deliberative Systems*, and *Negotiating Agreement in Politics*. She was President of the American Political Science Association in 2012-13. Her current work includes studies of representation, democratic deliberation, everyday activism, and the public understanding of free-rider problems.



**Manuel Muñiz** is the current Secretary of State for Global Spain, Ministry of Foreign Affairs, European Union and Cooperation. He was Rafael del Pino Professor of Practice of Global Leadership and Dean of IE School of Global and Public Affairs. He was Founding Director of IE's Center for the Governance of Change, an institution dedicated to studying the challenges posed by accelerated societal and technological transformation to the public and private sectors. Dr. Muñiz's research interests fall within



the fields of innovation and disruption, political economy, and regional and global governance. From 2015 to 2017 Dr. Muñiz was the Director of the Program on Transatlantic Relations at Harvard University's Weatherhead Center for International Affairs. Since 2017 he has been a Senior Associate at Harvard's Belfer Center for Science and International Affairs as well as one of the promoters of its Project on Europe and the Transatlantic Relationship. Dr. Muniz holds a JD (Law) from the Complutense University in Madrid, an MSc in Financial Markets from the IEB, a Master in Public Administration from the Kennedy School of Government, and a DPhil (PhD) in International Relations from the University of Oxford. He is a recipient of a number of awards and recognitions including the Trilateral Commission's David Rockefeller Fellowship and the Atlantic Council's Millennium Fellowship. In 2016 he was appointed by Esglobal as one of the 25 intellectuals having the greatest impact on our thinking about Iberoamerica.

**Joseph S. Nye Jr.** is University Distinguished Service Professor, and former Dean of the Harvard's Kennedy School of Government. He received his bachelor's degree summa cum laude from Princeton University, won a Rhodes Scholarship to Oxford University, and earned a PhD in political science from Harvard. He has served as Assistant Secretary of Defense for International Security Affairs, Chair of the National Intelligence Council, and Deputy Under Secretary of State for Security Assistance, Science and Technology. His most recent books include *The Power to Lead*, *The Future of Power*, and *Presidential Leadership and the Creation of the American Era*. He is a fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, the British Academy, and the American Academy of Diplomacy. In a recent survey of international relations scholars, he was ranked as the most influential scholar on American foreign policy, and in 2011, *Foreign Policy* named him one of the top 100 Global Thinkers.



**Ambassador Samantha Power** is the Anna Lindh Professor of the Practice of Global Leadership and Public Policy at Harvard Kennedy School and the William D. Zabel '61 Professor of Practice in Human Rights at Harvard Law School. From 2013 to 2017 Power served as the 28th U.S. Permanent Representative to the United Nations, as well as a member of President Obama's cabinet. In this role, Power became the public face of U.S. opposition to Russian aggression in Ukraine and Syria, negotiated the toughest sanctions in a generation against North Korea, lobbied to secure the release of political prisoners, helped build new international law to cripple ISIL's financial networks,



and supported President Obama's pathbreaking actions to end the Ebola crisis. President Obama has called her "one of our foremost thinkers on foreign policy," saying that "she showed us that the international community has a moral responsibility and a profound interest in resolving conflicts and defending human dignity." From 2009 to 2013, Power served on the National Security Council as Special Assistant to the President and Senior Director for Multilateral Affairs and Human Rights, where she focused on issues including atrocity prevention; UN reform; LGBT and women's rights; the promotion of religious freedom and the protection of religious minorities; and the prevention of human trafficking. Called by Forbes "a powerful crusader for U.S. foreign policy as well as human rights and democracy" when it named her one of the "World's 100 Most Powerful Women," Power has been recognized as a leading voice internationally for principled American engagement in the world. She has been named as one of Foreign Policy's "Top 100 Global Thinkers" and has twice been selected as one of TIME's "100 Most Influential People." Her book "A Problem from Hell": America and the Age of Genocide won the Pulitzer Prize and the National Book Critics Circle Award in 2003. Power is also the author of the New York Times bestseller *Chasing the Flame: One Man's Fight to Save the World* (2008) and the co-editor, with Derek Chollet, of *The Unquiet American: Richard Holbrooke in the World* (2011). Her most recent book, *The Education of an Idealist: A Memoir* (2019), was a New York Times, Wall Street Journal, and USA Today bestseller, and was selected as one of the best books of 2019 by the New York Times, Washington Post, Economist, NPR, TIME, Audible, and Christian Science Monitor.

**James K. ("Jim") Sebenius** specializes in analyzing and advising corporations and governments worldwide on their most challenging negotiations. He is the Gordon Donaldson Professor of Business Administration at Harvard Business School, where he founded the Negotiation unit and teaches advanced negotiation to graduate students and senior executives. He also directs the Harvard Negotiation Project at Harvard Law School. With co-author David Lax, Jim originated 3D Negotiation, a uniquely powerful approach for analyzing and advising on complex negotiations. He co-founded Lax Sebenius LLC, an active firm that offers strategic negotiation advice to clients and designs organizational capability-building programs to improve outcomes in mission-critical negotiations. Sebenius's private sector career has also included years with the Blackstone Group; in the public sector he served in the U.S. government's Commerce and State Departments. From the earliest days of his professional career, he



has played key roles in complex negotiations. For example, Peter G. Peterson, co-founder of The Blackstone Group, now the world's largest buyout firm, with \$545 billion in assets, stated that "We faced some of Blackstone's most challenging and delicate negotiations during its startup period. Over those early years, we worked daily with Jim, who was very helpful with critical deals at key moments... Jim's approach makes major differences in significant transactions." No less than former Secretary of State, Henry Kissinger, recently (2018) attested to Jim's standing in the negotiation field when he wrote "Given his familiarity with the relevant academic research and extensive experience in high-stakes dealmaking, Jim . . . possesses a deep understanding of complex negotiations...[he] has produced a superb and practical analysis of how to forge worthwhile agreements in complex situations." Since 2001, he has chaired the annual Great Negotiator Award program at Harvard, which has intensively engaged with negotiators such as Richard Holbrooke, James Baker, George Mitchell, and Bruce Wasserstein. He also co-directs a project that has conducted lengthy videotaped interviews with nine former U.S. Secretaries of State, from Henry Kissinger, George Shultz, and James Baker, through to Hillary Clinton, John Kerry and Rex Tillerson, about their most challenging negotiations. Jim often speaks to senior executive audiences about negotiating lessons and insights from the Great Negotiators and Secretaries of State. He is the author or co-author or editor of five books including 3D Negotiation (Harvard Business School Press), The Manager as Negotiator (Free Press), Negotiating the Law of the Sea (Harvard University Press), and, most recently, Kissinger the Negotiator: Lessons from Dealmaking at the Highest Level (HarperCollins). Together with these books, his published output includes more than 250 items including articles, case studies, and negotiation simulations.

**Amanda Sloat** is Fellow at the Project on Europe and the Transatlantic Relationship at the Belfer Center for Science and International Affairs. She is also a senior fellow in the Center on the United States and Europe at Brookings. Her areas of expertise include Turkey and Southern Europe, British politics, the European Union's foreign policy, and trans-Atlantic relations. Sloat served in the U.S. government for nearly a decade. She was most recently deputy assistant secretary for Southern Europe and Eastern Mediterranean Affairs at the State Department, where she was responsible for U.S. relations with Cyprus, Greece, and Turkey as well as for coordinating European engagement on Middle East issues. She also served



as senior advisor to the White House coordinator for the Middle East, North Africa and Gulf region and as senior advisor to the assistant secretary of state for European and Eurasian affairs. She previously worked as senior professional staff on the U.S. House of Representatives Foreign Affairs Committee, with responsibility for European policy. Prior to her government service, Sloat was a senior program officer with the National Democratic Institute, including work in Iraq with the Council of Representatives. She was also a post-doctoral research fellow with the Institute of Governance at Queen's University Belfast. During this time, she held visiting fellowships at the Academy of Sciences in the Czech Republic, United Nations Research Institute for Social Development, and the Jean Monnet Center at New York University Law School. She also served as a special advisor to the Scottish Parliament, Northern Ireland Assembly, and European Commission. Sloat holds a doctorate in politics from the University of Edinburgh and a bachelor's in political theory from James Madison College at Michigan State University. She has published a book, "Scotland in Europe: A Study of Multi-Level Governance" (Peter Lang Pub Inc, 2002). She has written widely on European politics in academic and foreign policy outlets.

**Lawrence H. Summers** is President Emeritus of Harvard University. During the past two decades he has served in a series of senior policy positions, including Vice President of development economics and chief economist of the World Bank, Undersecretary of the Treasury for International Affairs, Director of the National Economic Council for the Obama Administration from 2009 to 2011, and Secretary of the Treasury of the United States, from 1999 to 2001. He received a bachelor of science degree from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in 1975 and was awarded a Ph.D. from Harvard in 1982. In 1983, he became one of the youngest individuals in recent history to be named as a tenured member of the Harvard University faculty. In 1987 Mr. Summers became the first social scientist ever to receive the annual Alan T. Waterman Award of the National Science Foundation (NSF) and in 1993, he was awarded the John Bates Clark Medal, given every two years to the outstanding American economist under the age of 40. He is currently the Charles W. Eliot University Professor at Harvard University. He and his wife Elisa New, a professor of English at Harvard, reside in Brookline with their six children.



**Shoshana Zuboff** is the author of three books, each of which signaled the start of a new epoch in technological society. In the late 1980s her decade-in-the-making *In the Age of the Smart Machine: The Future of Work and Power* became an instant classic that foresaw how computers would revolutionize the modern workplace. At the dawn of the twenty-first century her influential *The Support Economy: Why Corporations Are Failing Individuals and the Next Episode of Capitalism* (with James Maxmin), written before the invention of the iPod or Uber, predicted the rise of digitally-mediated products and services tailored to the individual. It warned of the individual and societal risks if companies failed to alter their approach to capitalism. Now her masterwork, *The Age of Surveillance Capitalism: The Fight for a Human Future at the New Frontier of Power*, synthesizes years of research and thinking in order to reveal a world in which technology users are neither customers, employees, nor products. Instead they are the raw material for new procedures of manufacturing and sales that define an entirely new economic order: a surveillance economy. She is the Charles Edward Wilson Professor Emerita at Harvard Business School and a former Faculty Associate at the Berkman Klein Center for Internet and Society at Harvard Law School.

**Nicholas Burns** is the Roy and Barbara Goodman Family Professor of the Practice of Diplomacy and International Relations at the Harvard Kennedy School. He is the founder and Faculty Chair of the Future of Diplomacy Project and Faculty Chair of the Project on Europe and the Transatlantic Relationship. He serves on the Board of Directors of the Kennedy School's Belfer Center for Science and International Affairs, is a Faculty Affiliate of the Middle East Initiative, and is a Faculty Associate at Harvard's Weatherhead Center for International Affairs. Burns is Executive Director of the Aspen Strategy Group and Aspen Security Directors of Entegris, Inc. He is Chairman of the Board of Our Generation Speaks, which seeks to bring together young Palestinians and Israelis in common purpose. He is Chairman of the American Ditchley Foundation and serves on the Board of Trustees of Boston College. He also serves on the boards of several non-profit organizations, including Special Olympics International, the American School of Classical Studies in Athens, the Center for the Study of the Presidency and Congress, Refugees International, The Trilateral Commission, the Richard C. Lounsbery Foundation, the Atlantic Council, America Abroad Media, the Association of Diplomatic Studies and Training, the Appeal of Conscience Foundation, the Boston Committee on Foreign Relations, the Gennadius Library, the NATO Cyber Center of Excellence, and the Foreign Policy Association's Great Decisions Television Advisory Board. He serves on the Panel of Senior Advisors at Chatham House: the Royal Institute of International Affairs. He is a member of the Committee on Conscience of the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum, the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, the Council on Foreign Relations and the Order of Saint John. He is also a Fellow of the Massachusetts Historical Society. He is a life-long member of Red Sox Nation.



**Cathryn Clüver Ashbrook** is the founding Executive Director of the Future of Diplomacy Project, which examines the challenges to negotiation and statecraft in the 21st century, and the Project on Europe and the Transatlantic Relationship. She looks back on a ten-year career in international journalism and communications, during which she covered global affairs, most notably EU politics and business and the aftermath of September 11th, working as a producer and writer for CNN-International based in Atlanta and London. She served on the management team of the European Policy Centre in Brussels, where she was the Deputy Editor of its public policy journal, Challenge Europe and the think tank's Communications Director, before joining Roland Berger Strategy Consultants as Senior Journalist and consultant in 2005. There, she worked on public policy issues (demographic change, urban competitiveness, green energy) and advised both the consultancy's Chinese and French offices on branding and communication strategies. In 2009 she served in the second Bloomberg mayoral administration, where she implemented an online program for New York City's 1.8 million limited-English-proficiency migrants to access essential public services.



**Erika Manouselis** is the Project Coordinator for the Future of Diplomacy Project and for the Project on Europe and the Transatlantic Relationship. Previously, she worked as an advisor and speechwriter at the Permanent Mission of Brazil to the UN. She holds a B.A. in Classics and political science with honors from Brown University and an MPhil in Political Thought and Intellectual History from the University of Cambridge.



### Academic Directors

**Fernando Monge** is a senior associate with the Bloomberg Harvard City Leadership Initiative, a joint program of Harvard Business School and Harvard Kennedy School, funded by and executed in collaboration with Bloomberg Philanthropies. It is the world's most comprehensive effort to advance effective problem-solving and innovation in cities through executive education, research, curriculum development and field work. He is an adjunct professor at the IE School of Global and Public Affairs in Madrid, and collaborates with the World Bank, where previously he was a governance specialist advising on reforms to Governments in Latin America, the Middle East and Eastern Europe. His research and teaching focus on the challenges of innovating within the public sector, as well as of fostering and managing technological innovation to make cities more efficient, equitable and responsive to social needs. **Álvaro Renedo** is the 2019-2020 Rafael del Pino-Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Spain Fellow, at Harvard Kennedy School (Belfer Center for Science and International Affairs, Project on Europe and the Transatlantic Relationship). He is also a Fellow at the Real Colegio Complutense at Harvard University, and at the Common Security and Defense Policy Doctoral School (European External Action Service). A Spanish career diplomat, he served as Director of the Department of European Affairs and G20 in the Presidency of the Government of Spain from 2016-2018. In that capacity, he was the Sous-Sherpa of Spain, both in the EU and the G20. Prior to that, he held different posts in the field of EU affairs and G20, in the President's Office and the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. He is also an academic, and was Associate Professor in the Complutense University of Madrid (Department of Public International Law and International Relations) from 2014-2016. He is the author or coauthor of the following publications, among others: "Transatlantic Dialogue: The Missing Link in Europe's Post-Covid-19 Green Deal?"
